WAGOLL:

Constantly judged by his sharp teeth and keen instincts, he longed to prove that not all wolves were villains. Meanwhile, Hamlet, Oinks, and Chopsy—three mischievous, playful, and rather cheeky little pigs—snorted with laughter as they plotted their latest pranks. Teasing, tricking, and tumbling through the fields, they had a knack for causing trouble. Little did they know, their fun was about to take an unexpected turn…

Build Up
